Drought in South Africa has depleted their water reserves. Conversation now is an imperative. The alternative may lead to their scenario; Day Zero when there is no water.



The Other Virus

Most people who get the flu this season are getting sick with the H3N2 strain. But a smaller portion of people (around 10 to 15 percent) are getting the H1N1 strain or the influenza B virus, according to data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

For the past five flu seasons, health officials found that flu activity was elevated for around 16 weeks. So far this season, flu activity has been elevated for nine weeks, meaning that the flu season may be only about halfway over, according to the CDC.

How Much \$\$\$ Did They Save Our County?

The Arizona Poison and Drug Information Center experts state that they keep 70% of emergency callers at home. At \$1,500 per ER visit, this is an annual savings statewide of \$14,327,355. In Pima County, the estimated savings eclipses \$7,000,000.
